Brighter Visions

A thought for Christmas 2020 from Bishop Andrew

Friends, as we approach a Christmas like no other, a line from a familiar Christmas carol has come to mind: not 'In the bleak midwinter', though it may have sometimes felt like that in our gloomier moments. Not 'O tidings of comfort and joy', though that's been the inspired choice of the archbishops this year. But the phrase, 'Brighter visions beam afar'.

From the beginning of the millennium, you see, this year - 2020 - has been associated with visions. Taking its cue from the world of the opticians, and deploying

a rather obvious pun, every self-respecting business, school, hospital and church has had its 2020 Vision Statement, planning and preparing for this very moment, as 2020 draws to a close.

And such planning and preparations are important, of course, if our lives are to be fruitful and purposeful; and 2020 Vision Statements have their place. But what the *real* 2020 has reminded us is that even if our human vision might be proclaimed as faultless – 20/20 – when we next pay a visit to the opticians; there's something we need that goes way beyond that: the ability, in the words of the apostle Paul, to walk by faith, not by sight:

'Sages, leave your contemplations, 'Brighter visions beam afar'.

The first Christmas, after all – like the first Good Friday – like the first Easter Day – was entirely unforeseen. No manmade vision statements could have come up with the idea that the world's salvation would hang on the life of a tiny baby lying in a cattle shed, or an alleged blasphemer nailed to a cross, or an empty tomb and reports of a man risen from the dead. Only the divine vision of the prophets got anywhere the true story, and they ended up being ridiculed or thrown down wells for put in the stocks for their pains. As the first Christians went around proclaiming this message, they too were seen as fools, 'fools for Christ', as Paul again put it. But then he added, 'God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength'.

And as I reflect back on this past year, and as I look forward to Christmas, my original 2020 vision statement – which, speaking personally, involved a sabbatical, and writing a book on Discipleship, and fostering the first tentative signs of church growth across the diocese in the 2019 statistics, may lie in tatters; but perhaps that's a lesson in true discipleship itself. For following Jesus involves brighter visions than these, as together we choose to leave our human contemplations and 'Come and worship Christ, the newborn king'.

May God bless you and yours this Christmastime!

Morning Prayer at 10 am on Sunday Feast of St John the Evangelist

If there is more than one person present, someone may wish to read the parts marked (L), everyone says the rest together. You can say alternate verses in the Psalm and in the Canticles. Please have a Bible to hand.

(L) O Lord, open our lips
All: and our mouth shall proclaim your praise.

(L) You laid the foundation of the earth All: and the heavens are the work of your hands.

A candle is lit

(L) Blessed are you, sovereign God, creator of heaven and earth, to you be praise and glory for ever. As your living Word, eternal in heaven, assumed the frailty of our mortal flesh, may the light of your love be born in us to fill our hearts with joy as we sing: Blessed be God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. All: Blessed be God for ever.

This hymn is said or sung:

A great and mighty wonder, A full and holy cure! The virgin bears the Infant With virgin honour pure! Repeat the hymn again: To God on high be glory And peace on earth to men!

The Word becomes incarnate And yet remains on high, And cherubim sing anthems To shepherds from the sky. Repeat the hymn again: To God on high be glory And peace on earth to men!

While thus they sing your monarch, Those bright angelic bands, Rejoice, ye vales and mountains! Ye oceans, clap your hands! Repeat the hymn again: To God on high be glory And peace on earth to men!

Since all He comes to ransom, By all be He adored, The Infant born in Bethl'em, The Saviour and the Lord! Repeat the hymn again: To God on high be glory And peace on earth to men!

(L) The night has passed, and the day lies open before us; let us pray with one heart and mind:

All: As we rejoice in the gift of this new day, so may the light of your presence, O God, set our hearts on fire with love for you; now and for ever. Amen.

(L) Hear what Saint John says:
If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us.
If we confess our sins, God is faithful and just, and will forgive us our sins, and cleanse us from all unrighteousness.

We keep a moment of silence as we call to mind our sins:

(L) Lord Jesus, you are the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world. Lord, have mercy.

All: Lord, have mercy.

(L) Lord Jesus, you came not to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved. Christ, have mercy.

All: Christ, have mercy.

(L) Lord Jesus, you are the Saviour of the world. Lord, have mercy.

All: Lord, have mercy.

(L): May God who loved the world so much that he sent his Son to be our Saviour forgive us our sins and make us holy to serve him in the world, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Amen.

We now say The Gloria together:

Glory to God in the highest, and peace to his people on earth. Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory. Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father, Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; you are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer. For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

The collect for today St John the Evangelist:

Merciful Lord, cast your bright beams of light upon the Church: that, being enlightened by the teaching of your blessed apostle and evangelist Saint John, we may so walk in the light of your truth that we may at last attain to the light of everlasting life; through Jesus Christ your incarnate Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

Read 1 John 1 followed by Psalm 117 concluding with:

Glory to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit; as it was in the beginning is now and shall be for ever. Amen.

(L) Alleluia, alleluia. The Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen his glory.

All: Alleluia.

Now read John 21 v 19b - end

Here are some thoughts on today's readings from Fr Keith:

I like St John the Evangelist! That may seem a strange way to begin this reflection, but it's true. John is different from the other Gospel writers. Of course, all four evangelists tell the same story of our salvation through the death and resurrection of Jesus. But whereas Matthew, Mark and Luke have quite a lot of sayings and stories in common, John has a different style and way of presenting Jesus to the world. From the first verse of chapter 1 of his gospel, with his use of the term 'The Word' to describe Jesus, to the last verse, where he writes that there is much more that could be said about Jesus – John treads a parallel but separate road to the others.

Today is not the day for an in depth analysis of those differences. Many books have been written by scholars about John's writings and his theological perspective. But this morning I'd just like to share a few thoughts about his words that have spoken to me over the years, and made a profound impact on how I look at Jesus. You will all have your own views on John – some people find him difficult, others see him as the key that unlocks much more understanding of Jesus than any of the other New Testament writers.

To me the first chapter of John's gospel is the key to all of my understanding of Jesus. 'In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God.' John pulls no punches, at the outset of his writings he makes it clear that Jesus isn't just a good man, a prophet or a messenger from God, but actually God Himself, become human just like us – 'And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory'. There is no ambiguity here, God is not a God who is 'up there' remote and not fully understanding our human condition. Henceforth we know that he has experienced for Himself all that it means to be human, and therefore fully appreciates all of our joys and sorrows. We worship a God whose very nature has been revealed in a way that not even the prophets of old had expected.

The rest of John's gospel continues to reveal more about what this tells us about the kind of relationship God wants to have with us – a more personal and intimate relationship than people in the past had dared to imagine. John writes of a Jesus who turns water into wine at a wedding feast so that the celebrations can go on, when all seemed headed for disaster. Moreover, what he provides is the very best. Later John lets us see Jesus down on his knees washing his disciples' feet, in the manner of a servant. Here is the One through whom all things in the universe came into being, yet giving an example of humble service to others which he expects his disciples to replicate. A very different picture of God from what has gone before.

From the cross, in John's gospel, Jesus in his agony, still shows compassion for his mother and entrusts her into John's care. On Easter Day Jesus reveals himself to Mary Magdalene gently, by calling her by name. Although he had foretold his resurrection and his friends had failed to believe Him, Jesus doesn't get angry with them, but comes to them again in love and compassion. That same love is shown to Thomas when he doubts the words of the others about having seen Jesus alive again. He forgives Peter for his three denials, and gently tells him not to worry about matters

that don't concern him – like the fate of the beloved disciple. Peter's job was simply to follow Jesus on the path set out for him.

The manner and character of God as shown in all the writings of St John can be summed up in the verse from his first letter that is used at the start of the wedding service – 'God is love, and those who live in love, live in God, and God lives in them' (1 John 4 v 16). Also, in the verse from the gospel, which I had to learn by rote in Sunday school: 'God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life' John 3 v 16. God's life affirming love is the inspiration for St John and the key message that we, as Jesus' followers, are called to proclaim.

John is also clear about the purpose of God's intervention into the world to repair the damage of sin. Again, in his first letter, from the passage we heard this morning we find this: 'if we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves and truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he who is faithful and just will forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness. If we say we have not sinned, we make him a liar, and his word is not in us'. (1 john 1 v 9 - 10).

So, John's writings for me point me to the depths of God's love for me and all humanity. They speak of God's gentleness and concern, but also of God's justice and his desire for honesty and truth from us, if we are to have a proper relationship with him through Jesus. John emphasises Jesus' desire that we should all inherit eternal life – but our repentance is a prerequisite for that of course. John also uses the imagery of Jesus being the light in the darkness of this world, the light that no darkness can overcome. At this time when so many people are feeling the threat of the darkness of disease and disruption in their lives, perhaps more than ever we all need to read and reread the positive message that John's writings bring to us.

So, on this feast of St John, let us give thanks for the good news that he tells us of in his own special way. Alongside Matthew, Mark and Luke, John gives us even more insights into Jesus, and the Father who sent his Son that that we might have life, and have it abundantly, both now and into eternity. Amen.

(L) This is the message we have heard, All: the message we proclaim:

(L) that God is light.

All: In him there is no darkness at all.

(L) If we walk in the light All: as he is in the light,

(L) we have fellowship with one another, All: and the blood of Jesus his Son cleanses us from all sin.

We now say 'The Benedictus' together:

All: To us is born a Saviour, who is Christ the Lord, and all the heavenly hosts now sing, Glory to God in the highest.
