# Morning Prayer at 10 am on Sunday Feast of the Blessed Virgin Mary

If there is more than one person present, someone may wish to read the parts marked (L), everyone says the rest together. You can say alternate verses in the Psalm and in the Canticles. Please have a Bible to hand. You may wish to light a candle.

(L) O Lord, open our lips
All: and our mouth shall proclaim your praise.

(L) Mary said, 'Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be to me according to your word.'

Blessed is she who had faith that the Lord's promise would be fulfilled.

All generations shall call her blessed.
So tenderly has he looked upon his servant.

All generations shall call her blessed.
Blessed is she among women and blessed is the fruit of her womb.

All generations shall call her blessed.
Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit. Holy is his name.

All generations shall call her blessed.

This hymn is said or sung:

Her Virgin eyes saw God incarnate born, when she to Bethl'em came that happy morn; how high her raptures then began to swell, none but her own omniscient Son can tell.

As Eve when she her fontal sin reviewed, wept for herself and all she should include, blest Mary with man's Saviour in embrace joyed for herself and for all human race.

All saints are by her Son's dear influence blessed, she kept the very fountain at her breast; the Son adored and nursed by the sweet Maid a thousandfold of love for love repaid.

Heaven with transcendent joys her entrance graced, next to his throne her Son his Mother placed; and here below, now she's of heaven possessed, all generations are to call her blessed.

(L) The night has passed, and the day lies open before us; let us pray with one heart and mind:

All: As we rejoice in the gift of this new day, so may the light of your presence, O God, set our hearts on fire with love for you; now and for ever. Amen.

(L) We have done what was wrong in the Lord's sight and chosen what displeased him. Yet as a mother comforts her child, so shall the Lord himself comfort us. So let us come to him who knows our every deed and thought.

Pause to call to mind our sins

(L) Let us confess our sins in penitence and faith.

Lord Jesus, you are mighty God and Prince of Peace: Lord, have mercy.

Lord Jesus, you are Son of God and Son of Mary: Christ, have mercy.

Lord Jesus, you are Word made flesh and splendour of the Father; Lord, have mercy.

Have mercy on us Lord, forgive us our sins and bring us to everlasting life, we pray. Amen.

All say The Gloria:

Glory to God in the highest, and peace to his people on earth. Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory. Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father, Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; you are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer. For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

We now say this collect:

Almighty and everlasting God, who stooped to raise fallen humanity through the child-bearing of blessed Mary: grant that we, who have seen your glory revealed in our human nature and your love made perfect in our weakness, may daily be renewed in your image and conformed to the pattern of your Son Jesus Christ our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

Read Revelation 11 v 19 to 12 v 6 & 10 followed by Psalm 45 v 10 to end concluding with:

Glory to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit; as it was in the beginning is now and shall be for ever. Amen.

Read Galatians 4 v 4 - 7

(L) Alleluia, alleluia.
Hail, Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with you.
Blessed are you among women,
and blessed is the fruit of your womb.

All: Alleluia.

Now read Luke 1 v 46 - 55 Here are some thoughts on today's readings from Fr Keith:

When I was a curate in Liverpool, I was always on pilgrimage at Walsingham in Norfolk at this time of year. Members of our parish joined with one of our neighbouring parishes for a week there, during which the Feast of the Assumption of Mary was celebrated at the shrine. Like all pilgrimages it was a combination of relaxation and spirituality. There were days out as well as services, but the 15<sup>th</sup> August was always the highlight, as we gathered to give thanks for Mary's role in God's plan of salvation, and then her place in heaven for having said yes to God and for doing His will.

In medieval times Walsingham attracted thousands of pilgrims from all over England and beyond. A great abbey church was built and people from all walks of life made their way there to be spiritually uplifted and renewed. Even King Henry 8th went to Walsingham, before greed got the better of him and he had the Abbey destroyed, (along with many others across the country) and its' wealth confiscated. It was the local vicar in the 1930's who had the current shrine built and pilgrimages were revived. It was a controversial move, as many people in the Church of England then, and now, are deeply suspicious of any devotion to Mary. They confuse honouring Mary with worshipping her. Even today placard carrying protesters sometimes appear in the village denouncing the shrine as idolatrous. Worship Jesus only, they shout, completely missing the point of what Walsingham is all about. It really is about Jesus!

A popular name for the shrine at Walsingham is 'England's Nazareth', and at the heart of what goes on there is not worship of Mary, but an acknowledgement of the mystery of the Incarnation. Nazareth is where the story begins, of how Almighty God was prepared to come and experience life as a human being in order to save us from our sins. Walsingham is about recognising that fact and how God involved a humble, faithful young woman in his plan of salvation.

So, we, today, give thanks for Mary's involvement and look to her as an example of how, we too, should be open to God. As with Mary, no matter how poor or lowly we are, God can still use us to do great things for the sake of his Kingdom. Mary is one of us, and just as we can ask our friends on earth to pray for us, we can ask her to pray for us too from heaven.

The festival we are celebrating, is known, by millions of Christians as the 'Assumption' meaning that she was taken body and soul up to heaven – a bit like Elijah in the Old Testament. It is a reassurance of where we can be, if, like Mary, we keep our faith and believe in her Son as Saviour. Mary stood by Jesus even through her great sorrow as she witnessed His pain on the cross. She showed bravery when most of Jesus' followers had fled in fear, and she challenges us to be just as brave today. Mary was among those who first received the Holy Spirit on the Day of Pentecost and she reminds us that we have received the same gift. Mary challenges us, I believe, to think about what we are doing with that gift now – are we as faithful as her?

Our Gospel reading today is what is known as the Magnificat. It is Mary's song of celebration during her visit to her cousin Elizabeth after saying yes to God at the annunciation. It is said or sung daily at evening prayer and so is a constant reminder of the nature of the God that we worship.

Mary sings that God lifts up the poor and lowly, has mercy on all who fear him, scatters the proud and brings down the powerful, who do not fear him. He feeds the hungry, but sends away those whose wealth sets up barriers between them and God. He is always faithful and remembers His promises from the past, to have mercy on his people. He chooses the most unlikely people to work with Him, showing that His ways are different from our ways.

All generations have called Mary blessed, because she epitomises all these things about God's priorities, and is a shining example for us to follow on our journey of faith, towards eternity. When we think of Mary, we always think of her in the context of Jesus, it's not an either/or. Mary had a vital part to play in our salvation story, but only Jesus is God. Where Mary is now, at the side of Jesus, is where we too can be if we do the things that her Son told us to do repent and believe in his sacrifice for us.

Thomas Ken, Bishop of Bath and Wells in the late seventeenth century, wrote a hymn in celebration of Mary and her role in the Christian Faith which I have included in this weeks' Morning Prayer service on the website. It begins 'Her virgin eyes saw God incarnate born, when she to Bethl'em came that happy morn' and ends with the verse:

Heaven with transcendent joys her entrance graced, next to his throne her Son his Mother placed; and here below, now she's of heaven possessed, all generations are to call her blessed.

That's what today is all about, obedience on earth and joy in heaven. Let us pray for help to keep faithful, that, one day we may by God's grace, be with Mary there. Amen.

Now pause for your own reflections.

We say the Apostles' Creed:

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth. I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints. the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

We now say together:

- All: You have set us free to worship you without fear, holy and righteous in your sight.
- 1 Blessed be the Lord the God of Israel, ♦ who has come to his people and set them free.
- 2 He has raised up for us a mighty Saviour, \* born of the house of his servant David.
- 3 Through his holy prophets God promised of old ◆ to save us from our enemies, from the hands of all that hate us,
- 4 To show mercy to our ancestors, ♦ and to remember his holy covenant.
- 5 This was the oath God swore to our father Abraham to set us free from the hands of our enemies,
- 6 Free to worship him without fear, ◆ holy and righteous in his sight all the days of our life.
- 7 And you, child, shall be called the prophet of the Most High, ◆ for you will go before the Lord to prepare his way,
- 8 To give his people knowledge of salvation ◆ by the forgiveness of all their sins.
- 9 In the tender compassion of our God ♦ the dawn from on high shall break upon us,
- 10 To shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death, \* and to guide our feet into the way of peace.

All Glory to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit; as it was in the beginning is now and shall be for ever. Amen.

All: You have set us free to worship you without fear, holy and righteous in your sight.

Our prayers, today, are from Common Worship:

Your angel declared to Mary that she was to be the mother of the Saviour. Help every Christian person to be open to your word and obedient to your will.

Mary rejoiced with Elizabeth and sang your praise, 'My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord.' Help us to live joyful lives that sing your praise.

Lord, have mercy on those who fear you. Holy is your name.

Mary bore a son of David's line, a king whose reign would never end. Bless all the nations of the world with Christ's gift of peace.

Lord, have mercy on those who fear you. Holy is your name.

The child Jesus grew in wisdom and stature in the home of Mary and Joseph.

Strengthen our homes and families, and keep under your protection all those whom we love.

Lord, have mercy on those who fear you. Holy is your name.

At the foot of the cross of Christ stood his mother, and from the cross she received his lifeless body in her arms. Give comfort and healing to all who suffer and all who watch the suffering of those they love.

Lord, have mercy on those who fear you. Holy is your name.

The apostle John saw a vision of a woman in heaven, robed with the sun.
Bring us with Iris Day and all those who have died in the faith of Christ to share the joy of heaven with Mary and all the saints.

Lord, have mercy on those who fear you. Holy is your name.

Almighty and everlasting God, your handmaid Mary magnified your name and rejoiced in your saving love: trusting in that same love, we ask all these our prayers through Jesus Christ our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

As Jesus taught us, so we pray: Our Father in heaven....

This hymn may be said or sung:

- 1 Sing we of the blessed Mother who received the angels word, And obedient to his summons bore in love the infant Lord; Sing we of the Joys of Mary at whose breast that child was fed Who is Son of God eternal and the everlasting Bread.
- 2 Sing we, too, of Mary's sorrows, of the sword that pierced her through, When beneath the cross of Jesus she his weight of suffering knew, Looked upon her Son and Saviour reigning from the awful tree, Saw the price of man's redemption paid to set the sinner free.
- 3 Sing again the joys of Mary when she saw the risen Lord, And in prayer with Christ's apostles, waited on his promised word: From on high the blazing glory of the Spirit's presence came, Heavenly breath of God's own being, manifest through wind and flame.
- 4 Sing the greatest joy of Mary when on earth her work was done, And the Lord of all creation brought her to his heavenly home: Virgin Mother, Mary blessed, Raised on high and crowned with grace, May thy Son, the world's redeemer, Grant us all to see his face.

Let us pray:

(L) Almighty God,
who looked upon the lowliness
of the Blessed Virgin Mary
and chose her to be the mother of your only Son:
grant that we who are redeemed by his blood
may share with her in the glory of your eternal kingdom;
through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord,
who is alive and reigns with you,
in the unity of the Holy Spirit,
one God, now and for ever.

All: May the love of the Holy Family surround us.
May the joy that was Mary's refresh us.
May the faithfulness that was Joseph's encourage us.
May the peace of the Christ-child fill our lives.
And may the grace of God Father, Son and Holy Spirit, be with us and remain with us now and always. Amen.

May the souls of the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace, and rise with Christ in glory. Amen.

#### **Evening Prayer for this week**

O Lord open our lips, and our mouth shall show forth your praise.

O God make speed to save us. O Lord, make haste to help us.

- 1 I love you, O Lord my strength. ◆
  The Lord is my crag, my fortress and my deliverer.
- 2 In my distress I called upon the Lord ♦ and cried out to my God for help.
- 3 He heard my voice in his temple ♦ and my cry came to his ears.
- 4 He parted the heavens and came down \* and thick darkness was under his feet.
- 5 He rode upon the cherubim and flew; \u22c4 he came flying on the wings of the wind.
- 6 He made darkness his covering round about him, ♦ dark waters and thick clouds his pavilion.

Teach me to live, that I may dread the grave as little as my bed; teach me to die, that so I may rise glorious at the awful day.

O may my soul on thee repose, and with sweet sleep mine eyelids close; sleep that shall me more vigorous make to serve my God when I awake.

When in the night I sleepless lie, my soul with heavenly thoughts supply; let no ill dreams disturb my rest, no powers of darkness me molest.

Praise God, from whom all blessings flow; praise him, all creatures here below; praise him above, ye heavenly host: praise Father, Son, and Holy Ghost.
